

We are working on programs and services that align the sailing community and drive innovation within three key areas: Access to Sailing, Training and Education, and Competitive Excellence.

Access

First Sail

US Sailing recently launched First Sail, a nationwide, grass-

Youth Sailing

strategy.




Reach

Education

National Faculty

To support people's aspiration for more education, we continue to develop products



Faculty, who come together to serve as a "think tank" to exchange new ideas and best practices. In 2016, the National Faculty met in St. Petersburg, Florida and spent three days improving and creating our offerings.

Online Learning

Developed in partnership with Fresh Air Educators, US Sailing launched Basic Keelboat Online, a webbased supplement to the Basic Keelboat course. The online course is designed to prepare aspiring sailors for on-the-water instruction in the Basic Keelboat course, while allowing US Sailing instructors to ensure a consistent level of knowledge for incoming students.

In 2017, a complete online Safety at Sea Seminar curriculum will be offered that provides a standalone platform for safety education appropriate for all sailors, and complements the intensive hands-on seminars for offshore sailors.



US Sailing and SAP

The initial phase of the US Sailing/SAP partnership focused on increasing access to offshore racing in the U.S. by simplifying the process for boat owners to get on the starting line. The user-friendly Universal Certification System (UCS) platform drastically lowers the hurdles for new racers to get involved and,

through SAP technology, we are now able to streamline the process and empower sailors and boat owners to make better decisions about their boats.



We worked closely with SAP on the creation of a live-tracking and analytics mobile app, SAP Sail InSight, that provides sailors and teams with valuable data for post-race analysis. We will be releasing more details about product developments, updates and availability in 2017.



Racing Rules

In the fall of 2016 we rolled out *The Racing Rules* of *Sailing for 2017-2020*. From printed paper rulebooks and waterproof versions to mobile device apps, the new racing rules are made available in various formats for your ease of access. Medals at Youth Worlds

US Sailing's 13-member Youth Worlds Team secured three medals at the world's premier youth regatta. The team was selected based on the results from the 2016 U.S. Youth Sailing Championships, organized by US Sailing and hosted by the Coronado Yacht Club in August. The Youth Worlds Team's success is indicative of the competitive excellence of America's youth sailors and their local sailing organizations, and the support provided by the Olympic Development Program and US Sailing's youth programs.

Caleb Paine, Daniela Moroz Named US Sailing's 2016 Rolex Yachtsman and Yachtswoman of the Year

Under immense pressure to return Team USA to the Olympic podium in sailing, Caleb Paine prevailed in an epic medal race to earn a bronze medal in the Finn class, the Men's Heavyweight Dinghy at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. In his first career Olympic Games, Paine led the medal race at every mark. He passed Croatia's Ivan Kljakovic Gaspic in the overall standings to earn a place on the podium.

"It was a tough battle for me, and I feel fortunate to come up with a medal in the end," said Paine. "I didn't get off to the best start, but I kept my eyes open and saw an opportunity to make a gain on the right side, and it was go all the way or nothing at all, so I had to fully commit and fortunately it paid off."

In early March, the Rio 2016 Selection Series in the Finn class came to a memorable conclusion at the Finn European Championship in Barcelona. Paine came from behind to win his first career U.S. Olympic Sailing Team berth over Beijing 2008 Silver Medalist Zach Railey.

Paine became the first American to medal in sailing at the Olympics since Railey and Anna Tunnicliffe (gold), both accomplished the feat at the 2008 Beijing Games. Foiling prodigy Daniela Moroz has reached the pinnacle of her sport at the age of 15. On the world's largest stage, the high school sophomore rose to the occasion on the final day of racing at the IKA Formula Kite World Championship last September in Weifang-Binhai, China.

Moroz was on equal points with reigning world champion,
Russian Elena

Kalinina, 18, on the last day of racing. Despite the light air, which had typically favored Kalinina, Moroz won all four races on the final day to secure the world championship.

"It's always been something I dreamed of doing ever since I started kiting," said Moroz. "I've been training and racing with Erika Heineken since the beginning and she is a role model and inspiration to me. To be able to do what she did means a lot."

Moroz posted top results throughout 2016 on the Hydrofoil Pro Tour. She placed first in the women's fleet at the Final Round in Rockingham, Western Australia and first place at Round Three in Pointe d'Esny, Mauritius. Moroz's consistent results propelled her to the top of the Hydrofoil Pro Tour women's final standings.
