Board Action Requested (word this in resolution form): Resolved: The Board approves the recommendation of the Offshore Committee to issue the Safety Equipment Requirements for 2022-2023 as submitted by the Safety at Sea Committee.
Strategic Plan Alignment: Describe below how and why this is aligned to the current strategic plan. Since 2013US Sailing has created and promulgated the Safety Equipment Requirements every two years (matching the cycle of the Offshore Special Recommendations of World Sailing). Among much other work in US Sailing, the SERs deliver on our promise of the role we play as a National Governing Body and a Member National Authority (MNA) of World Sailing.
Mission Impacts: Describe below how and why this creates value to our organization. By issuing these requirements, we promote safety at sea for US sailors, and provide standardization in equipment and training required across the country. Training for sailors is delivered through courses run by the Education department and our Training Partners. By issuing the SERs, US Sailing fulfills one of its roles as a MNA under World Sailing. Also we enhance the deliverables of Member Development, and of Competitive Services and Support, leading to new members and higher retention of members.
Member Impacts: Describe below the impacts (i.e. Will it be seen as a member benefit or not? Explain) Both Organizing Authorities and Persons in Charge of boats racing and cruising refer to the SERs as their key source of intelligence about safety in design, equipment and training. The value of this is hard to overestimate, as sailors need an authoritative guide when selecting and equipping boats, and training crew.

Subject: Payment for professional research on tax & accounting related issues to assist athletes in more efficiently managing their program income and expenses from a tax saving perspective.

Action Requested: Motion to approve up to \$20,000 for tax research to benefit our athletes by identifying ways to maximize income tax options for their benefit which results can be incorporated into a planned Athlete Program Guide that among other sections, will have one on Financial Management Practices. Payment would be made from monies reserved for such purposes in the Olympic Windfall Fund. Progress of the research will be closely managed by John Schoendorf and Heather Monoson so as to limit cost to the extent possible.

Member Impacts: None anticipated

Mission Impacts:

The end product will increase athlete understanding of tax reporting alternatives for the purpose of saving them time away from sailing, monies paid to professional tax advisors and increasing fund accumulation that can be better used in their programs.

Perceived positive effects are that athletes will have the benefit of receiving very focused professional tax guidance for managing their accounting records which they can share with their individual tax advisors without having to spend the money or time trying to do the same on their own. This will also dramatically reduce or eliminate numerous misunderstandings about best practices in this area and illustrate how we are trying to provide more positive assistance to our athletes.

Negative impacts: None anticipated

Financial Impacts:

Positive effects: Will save valuable staff time trying to navigate numerous issues regarding 1099 reporting and numerous other related issues related to recordkeeping.

Negative effects: None anticipated.



Subject: D & O Insurance Coverage Limit for 2022.

Action Requested: Motion to approve \$5 million in D & O coverage for the new policy year.

Member Impacts: None anticipated

Mission Impacts:

D & O coverage will be reduced from a combined \$16 million to \$5 million. This is primarily due to a change in insurance industry standards and how D & O coverage is managed.

Perceived positive effects are that although coverage is dramatically less than in prior years, this reduced coverage limit will be sufficient to cover any exposure to the directors and officers under the policy.

Negative impacts: N/A.

Financial Impacts:

Positive effects will be a savings of \$12,000 in premium that would have been incurred to obtain an additional \$5 million in coverage.

Negative effects: None are anticipated based on past claim history and discussions with senior representatives at the Gowrie Group.
